

### **CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

Feedback on curricula obtained from students, parents and stakeholders have facilitated changes of the curriculum and innovative initiatives ensure continuous

growth. The career guidance and placement cell equip the students in soft skills and all-round personality development.

The development of communication skills is the need of the hour. Realizing its importance our college has arranged and conducted many seminars on spoken and written skills in English. Introduction of new courses and restructuring of existing ones has led to an increase in admission and enhancing the suitable employability. More than 70 eminent resource persons in various disciplines across the country have visited the institution.

### **Teaching - Learning and Evaluation**

Admission to the courses and the programmes is by a transparent, welladministered mechanism ad hearing to all the norms of the affiliated university. The college ensures equity and probity and wide access by the following the policy of first come first served basis and is well represented by students from different socioeconomic, cultural and educational backgrounds. The students admitted in this institution are from rural and semi-urban background. The entry of the freshers is made comfortable with a formal welcome accorded by the seniors of each department. The college has adequate in-built mechanism which is periodically and continually updated to achieve the goals of academic excellence. The college plans and organizes teaching, learning and evaluation schedules by strictly following the academic calendar by maintaining academic diaries of the important events of the curricular and co-curricular activities.

Fully aware of the extent and significance of institutional accountability in the teaching, learning and evaluation process, individualized teaching-learning programmes and coaching are conducted to impart to the broad spectrum of academic caliber of the students admitted. Continuous internal assessments and class tests are conducted to evaluate the academic needs of the students. Slow learners, and advanced learners are identified through an analysis of the formative tests and remedial classes are arranged to aid the slow learners to adapt themselves to the rigorous teachings, learning process and to make praiseworthy academic advancement.

ICT based teaching, learning independent learning methods through seminars, assignments and quizzes are some of the best practices for the summative semester exams to be conducted by the university. Student mentoring and guidance services are provided to the students at the academic, personal and psycho-social levels. The college also organizes programmes to sensitize the faculty and students on gender inclusion and development.

The college maintains the student-centric and learner-centric atmosphere to achieve the desired and targeted learning outcomes. The lecturers employ interactive and participatory approach creating a feeling of responsibility in learning and shape the learning process of constructive knowledge. Two seminar halls fitted with LCD projectors, availability of two portable projectors, a separate computer lab with internet facility for the staff, Wi-Fi facility and systems with internet connectivity for the students which are used extensively for dissemination of knowledge and evaluation and to enable the access of e-resources for the teaching-learning process. Interactive instructional techniques like group discussions, projects both at UG and PG levels, brain storming sessions, experiments, power point presentation (PPT) and application of ICT resources which enrich the teaching-learning experience and engage students in high order of thinking and investigation. Creating question banks, regular evaluation and assessment of questions for summative exams are some of the best practices of the college. Regional and national level seminars/conferences/workshops, invited talks and discussions are an integral segments of our learning process. Eminent national scientist from CECRI, DST and TNCST illumine our faculty members and students.

Teacher quality is assured by recharging the faculty members in their own discipline and on general professional competence through training programmes and faculty development programmes both inside and outside this college. The faculty members take initiative to learn and keep abreast of the latest developments to innovate continuously to seek improvement in their work and to strive for individual and institutional excellence. The strong feed-back mechanism for faculty involving selfappraisal, feedback from students, stake holders and head of the institution help faculty members to enhance their professional competency. The college has introduced many evaluation reforms in the recent past. Innovative evaluation process based on internal assessment helps to gauge the knowledge and skills acquired and also to enhance the competency of students.

### **Research, Consultancy and Extension**

The college encourages its staff to take up research activities and engage in interdisciplinary and interdepartmental research activities. Promotion and development of research activities are led by our research and development committee. The committee acts as a facilitator for the faculty research providing the details of funding agencies in different research areas, This has resulted in the submission of minor projects to UGC, research article publications in national/international journals and research articles in the proceedings of the national/international seminars are recorded. More than 5 research papers have been presented in national/international seminars. Research ambiance on the campus is achieved by the visits of experts and scientists during national / international workshops/seminars and their interactions with students. Promotions of research culture and aptitude among students are done by the respective departments through minor project and social surveys.

The college encourages research on topics/issues of contemporary relevance and global significance through major/minor projects to promote research among the staff and students. The policy of the institution is to promote campus to community research culture that has led to a number of case studies and projects impact of rural development programmes.

The college provides full support in term of administrative academic and human resources required to enable faculty to submit project proposal and approach funding agencies for mobilizing resources for research. Theoretical and practical findings of our faculty in various fields like Microbiology and English literature have been beneficial to their respective disciplines and society at large.

Collaborations with many research institutes and laboratories provide opportunities for the staff to undergo their research work. The college has collaborated with research centers like CECRI and fisheries in Mandapam to enable the science students to get exposed to sophisticated science instruments. Collaborations with different agencies and NGOS offer the students some practical exposure and a chance to apply their learning in their respective fields. The department of computer science and information technology and carrying on their project works with MOU of the college has also entered into tie-ups with industries. Many members of faculty are also engaged in active research by way of publications of articles in national and international journals. As many as ISBN books have been published by the faculty members. Research articles have been published in international journals. Other publications include the college magazine and department magazines of every department provide a platform for students to sharpen and exhibit their creative skills.

Consultancy services in the areas of counselling skill development of the rural youth through and communication skills are available at the college. Weekly value education classes are conducted for all UG majors in all semesters. The public relation committee maintains the healthy relationship with all stakeholders including social bodies, NGOs and media to reach out to society at large.

The college has wide range of extension and outreach programmes with special focus on the under-privileged and the vulnerable sections of society. The extension programmes namely NSS, YRC, RRC, CCC, EDP provide innumerable opportunities to students to reach out to society and contribute their mite in ameliorating the lot of people who are oppressed, powerless and disadvantaged. Workshop, talks, awareness campaigns are regularly held by the organization like NSS, YRC, RRC, CCC, EDP.

Inaugurating programmes like blood donation camps, awareness of first aid, human rights day, voters day which are organized from time-to-time have a visible impact in terms of generating knowledge, developing sensitivities towards community

issues, social inequity etc and in inculcating sterling qualities like selfless service and sense of responsibility towards society. To make the campus eco-friendly rain water harvesting, plastic free and tobacco free campus and plantation programmes are conducted. As part of our mission statement, we our management are zeroing in on the clean and hygienic environment in our college to maintain the ambiance atmosphere.

### Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Infrastructure facilities are important for effective and efficient conduct of the educational programmes. The institution has 36 well furnished class rooms, 4 labs, 2 seminar halls with mounted LCD projector, two multipurpose halls, one multimedia hall and an auditorium. The college is having a broadband in the campus for connectivity of internet 2mbps. The computer centre is used extensively for academic and administrative purposes. The college has automation facilities in the office library and lab. Well equipped seminar hall and LCD's are available to facilitate computer aided teaching and broaden the teaching and learning experience.

The college has an exclusive multimedia hall fully equipped for screening educational movies for the subjects that promote the better understanding of the students.

The computer lab has computers with Wi– Fi facility for the students. The college has spacious playground and a common room with provision for indoor games. The library the nerve centre of learning has an open access system. The library is equipped with one computer with internet connectivity to download materials on the latest topic.

The hostel for male students is situated near the precincts of the college and consists of two floors to accommodate UG&PG student. There is another hostel for girls with two floors adjacent to the precincts of the college. Elaborate and safe arrangements

have been made in the hostel to provide academically conducive, comfortable and secure accommodation with homely ambience and satisfaction.

### Student's supportive activities and progression

The diverse programmers in academic and co-academic as well as sports, cultural and scientific activities are well synchronized and reinforced with an effective support system to produce enlighten and self reliant male and female youths as visualized in the vision and mission of the college.   - The college has an academic calendar in conformity with the university calendar to implement the curriculum. Each and every department formulates its own action/course plan and departmental routines monthly review meetings of the department take stock of the progress towards effective implementation. The academic council reviews the academic progress of the college very often in consultation with the Heads of the Departments.
  - The college directs all the departments and faculty to prepare a lesson plan for each subject and let follow it accordingly.

Taking into account the difficulties and experiences of the students and teachers, the college writes to the board of studies to make necessary additions or deletions in the prescribed curricula.

# 1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The enrichment programmes are of both curricular and co-curricular types. There is a formal mechanism like holding examinations and giving certificates for the enrichment courses. The co-curricular activities are not evaluated by conventional methods. However, the college keenly monitors the programmes and makes necessary improvements when needed.

#### 1.4 FEEDBACK SYSTEM

# 1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the university?

As an affiliated college, the college does not have direct role in preparing the curriculum. However, several teachers of the college are actively engaged as subject experts in preparing syllabus for various subjects as members of undergraduate board of studies.

- 1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the university and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes'/new programmes?
  - Yes, there is a formal mechanism to obtain feedbacks from students and other stakeholders. The IQAC collects, examines and makes necessary recommendations to the Academic committee to communicate the same to the university.

#### FEEDBACK MECHANISM AND ITS INPUT

#### FEEDBACK FROM STUDENTS

- Feedback is considered as the stepping stone for betterment and change and it is collected from students at different levels course-wise evaluation is collected at the department level from every student at the end of each semester. Every year the outgoing students evaluate the entire programme including the curricular, extra curricular and student services of the college. Evaluation is also done by alumni when they return to the campus for their graduation and during the annual alumni meet.
- Feedback regarding academic content and other provisions at the departmental level and the college level is obtained from parents during the parent teachers meet.

#### QUALITY SUSTENANCE AND ENHANCEMENT

- Quality is sustained through academic audits which are held once in six months.
- Faculty members of all disciplines attend workshops, seminars and conferences organized at the state, national and international levels. This enables them to be abreast of the most recent developments in their disciplines. This, in turn, helps them to introduce advancement in the curriculum.
- The college organizes various programmes which are conducted in each department to bring all teachers up-to date with the latest development in their respective disciplines and to provide appropriate skills- training in


the use of new software and equipment. The management of this college provides financial support to each activity.

#### 2.1 STUDENTENROLMENT& PROFILE

- 2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?
  - The strong reputation built over the years as a premier institution with a progressive outlook, brings aspirants to Syed Hameedha Arts & Science College from diverse backgrounds. The quality of academic input attracts applicants for admission into the college who come from the creamy layer and also from the disadvantaged section of the society. Students with excellent academic credentials as well as first generation learners with high aspirations find entry into the campus. Students' enrolment procedure is in strict accordance with the norms required by the state Government. By virtue of its status as a minority Muslim institution, the college exercises the right not only in favour of prospective Muslim students but also for accommodating the marginalized and those who do not have a chance of securing admission elsewhere. The college has the choice of candidates for the courses. However, it remains true to its mission of imparting holistic education based on the proper values of love, justice, equality and peace in young generation from all strata of society. Hence, the student profile of the college is often a healthy mix of young generations who are both high achievers and the under-achievers, the privileged and the marginalized, cutting across different economic and social backgrounds.
  - Syed Hameedha Arts & Science College believes in matching needs with resources and goes the extra mile by supporting needy students with resources in the form of scholarships, counselling and academic guidance within and beyond the class room.

#### 2.1.1 A D MISSION PROCESS

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#### **PHASE I - ADMINISTRATIVE PROCESS**

• A committee nominated by the principal prepares the prospectus and the application forms. The prospectus includes the curricular highlights, employment opportunities, student support services and departmental updates.

#### **PHASE II - PUBLICITY AND TRANSPARENCY**

• Special programmes are conducted for school children by individual department as part of their service. Our college curriculum instills a thirst for higher levels of learning and enhances the quality and quantity of admission. The college organizes exhibitions for school children with adequate representation from each department, to create an increased awareness among them regarding the final distinctions among the various fields of Higher Education and the available career options which in turn helps them to make choices. Courses offered in the colleges are popularized through media advertisements, Newspapers, institutional website and distribution of pamphlets in schools. Career guidance programme is organized by our institution for 12<sup>th</sup> standard students and guidelines are provided about the various courses available. Notice boards and charts are kept near the college entrance displaying the admission process.

#### PHASE III-SELECTION PROCESS AND CRITERIA

#### UNDERGRADUATE AND POSTGRADUATE PROGRAMMES

- After the declaration of higher secondary results, the filled in forms can be submitted in the college.
- On the date of admission, all original documents are verified and the candidate is admitted after payment of fees.
- Based on the number of vacancies for admission, subsequent provisional selection lists are prepared.
- For all the academic programmes, after admission, each student is given a unique registration number with an identity card to confirm his / her enrolment.

#### ADMISSION REVIEW MECHANISM AND FOLLOW UP ACTION

- The number and composition of the candidates applied and admitted in the undergraduate programme is discussed at the principal's meeting. The departments whose programmes are in high demand are encouraged to consider starting additional sections whereas those with very low demand are directed to take extra measures to enhance their enrolment.
- 2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

## STRATEGIES ADOPTED FOR INCLUSIVENESS IN ADMISSION SC/ST AND OBC

• Reservation policies of the government are rigidly followed to ensure that the strategies adopted by the government in the creation of equity and provision of access to the SC/ST and OBC applicants are implemented. In the event of a deserving SC/ST candidate filing an application for admission after the SC/ST quota has been filled up, the management takes step to make special provisions for its admission in the minority/management quota.

#### **DIFFERENT CATEGORIES OF PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES**

• Physically and visually challenged students are also admitted. Class rooms are arranged to the convenience of students. Their grievances are heard and their requirements are fulfilled to their satisfaction.

#### ECONOMICALLY WEAKER SECTION

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- State and central government scholarships are available to the students. Economically weaker students are permitted to pay their tuition and other dues on installment basis. Besides, they are allowed to pay their dues till the end of their academic year.
- Poor Muslim students are offered financial assistance under Baithul Maal financial aid scheme every year. The students belong to the Muslim minority community and economically weaker are rendered this service by the management of this institution for uplifting their economical status and educational career.

#### **OUTSTANDING ACHIEVERS IN SPORTS AND EXTRA CURRICULAR**

#### **ACTIVITIES**

- Sports students are given admissions in the major of their choice.
- They are given either fee waiver or concession on payment of fees.
- Special provisions have been made with regard to the requirements of formative evaluation of sports students keeping in mind situations beyond their control which results in their prolonged absence from classes.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profile annually? If 'yes' What is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes, the admission committee reviews the entire admission process every year and takes necessary steps to change the criteria for admission. And it takes call to ensure that the policies are transparent and satisfactory to all stakeholders. For example, a major change made by introducing credit-point as the criteria for admission. Instead of admitting the students solely on the basis of marks in their examinations, credited point has been calculated by adding the mark of the subject in which 'major' is sought. This not only helps in selecting the deserving students for major programmes but also saves valuable time by avoiding major entrance tests after admission. Students also appear to be happy for being admitted into the major course directly on the day of admission itself.

#### **NECESSARY MAESURES TO COPE WITH INCREASED DEMAND**

The college has conducted analysis of demand for the various programmes offered. This shows an increase in demand for undergraduate programmes like English, Commerce, Physics, Mathematics, Computer science, Bachelor of Computer Application and Information Technology. There has been a steady increase in the demand ratio for M.COM(Computer Applications) and M.Sc., (Computer Science) since 2009. The increased demand was duly informed to Alagappa University.

The college takes special care to promote equity by giving special preference to students belonging to economically weaker section, differently abled students and those

with proficiency in sports and other extra-curricular activities. Government reservation policy is also followed to promote education among students belonging to weaker section like SC, ST and OBC.

Ensuring consistency in the academic progress of all who enter the campus is a significant challenge and the college meets this demand appropriately

- Comprehensive analysis of the examination results.
- A comprehensive analysis of the examination result is carried out by the controller of examination. The steady increase in pass percentage observed from the first year to the third year reveals that the desired outcome of academic progress is realized.

#### FOR MATIVE TEST ANALYSIS

Analyses of the formative tests are done for each course in all departments. This throws light on the number of slow learners in every course. The provision of remedial coaching is arranged for the under achievers and slow learners are identified on the basis of this analysis is an endeavor in this regard.

## FOR MATIVE IMPROVEMENT

For the UG students, a special provision is made to allow them to improve their formatives requirements within the semester.

• Supplementary Examinations in July.

#### ACADE MIC ADVISING

A personalized attempt in helping the students towards consistent academic progress in the Academic Advising system where each student is assigned an academic advisor among the faculty from the respective department. This system facilitates the continuous monitoring of the students' progress as the student is required to report to the academic advisor frequently and to obtain approval from the academic advisor on issues related to leave, retest, improvement test and scholarships.

#### PARENT-TEACHERS MEETINGS

A healthy rapport is built between the parents and the teachers to jointly monitor the academic progress of the students. Parents are informed about the academic performance of students through parent-teacher meetings in each semester. In the event of an inability to conduct such a meeting, a copy of the mark statement with appropriate verbal remarks is posted to the parents. Parents are encouraged to approach the departments for clarifications at any time.

There are departmental programmes and mandatory requirements that students have to complete during their semester such as project and field survey. Courses on personality development and seminars are examples of learning experiences.

The college is busy during the summer vacation with the conduct of the repeat examination that helps the slow performers to clear their arrears. Remedial coaching to help weak students prepare for the supplementary examinations.

#### CHALLENGING THE GIFTED

The advanced learners have an opportunity for getting the degree to use their potential in meaningful academic exercise. Meritorious tests are conducted for these students department wise to get university ranks.

Being a co-educational college this takes special care to sensitize its staff and students on issues of gender and inclusion. The students are regularly introduced to the concepts and issues like gender equality, female health and hygiene, AIDS and other STDS, female feticide, women's education, etc.. Promotion of women's education, health and hygiene are some of the care issues that come to prominence in the functioning of the NSS. The teaching and non-teaching staffs too are sensitized to issues like position of staff in work places, staff dignity etc.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special education/learning needs of advanced learners?

The various departments regularly monitor the advancement of the students in their respective subjects and in the course of time identify the advanced learners. After this special efforts are made to expose them to the latest advancements in the relevant fields by holding special classes.

# TEACHING LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The visionary character of the college is well evidenced in the manner in which it plans and organizes the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules well in advance.

#### ACADE MICCALAENDAR

The college calendar is prepared every year by the principal in consultation with the Heads of Department and other administrative officer of the college. The calendar is published in the college Handbook every year. The calendar consists of the academic activities such as formative and summative examination dates, day order, working days,

educational tours, in-house seminars and symposium, NSS programme schedules, important functions, group discussion etc.

- ii. Scheme of work / work diary

#### 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

At the beginning of each semester, all teachers prepare a work plan for the entire semester for every course they handle. The work plan has the contents to be taught during the specific period of time with the precise details of the teaching methodology. The Heads of the Departments periodically check the individual work plan of the respective faculty. Overall adherence to the plan is assessed during the internal academic audit which is conducted once in every semester. Students feedback collected at the end of every semester is also considered while making the work plan and during its implementation for subsequent action.

The IQAC contributes to improve the teaching learning process by taking the following responsibilities:

- 7. Arranging motivational programmes & career counselling for students.
- 8. Documentation of various programmes for quality improvements.
- 9. Promotion & internalization of good practices.
- 10. Preparation and submission of Annual Quality Assurance Report to NAAC and parent University.
- **11.** Interactions with the parent university.
- 12. Introduction of Teacher's Diary for proper maintenance of academic records.
- 13. Maintenance of self-appraisal report of faculty members.

#### PARADIGMSHIFTINTEACHING

The institution as a whole and individual faculty members in each department are marking a well-intended and concerted effort to move away from the teacher-centric lecture method to the learner-centric alternative pedagogy. This is the outcome of the series of seminars and namely accelerated learning, student-centric learning, renovation & rejuvenation of curriculum, etc to which the faculty were exposed and other methods of learning.

#### OTHER METHODS OF LEARNING

Apart from the classroom interaction between student and teacher, other methods of learning experiences are also provided in our college. Creative facilitation of the Teaching-Learning process is done through in-house training, laboratory work, tutorials, group activities, creative assignments, case studies, group discussions, seminars, field work, guest lectures and survey methods.

ICT-enabled teaching in the form of using computerized e-course modules together with assessment exercises is some of the new trends in teaching. The use of language laboratories, mind-mapping, role plays, in-the-spot studies, problem solving exercise, referral work are also some of the different methods that are adopted here.

#### **TEACHING-LEARNING STRATEGIES**

#### HOLISTIC AND STUDENT-CENTRIC LEARNING

The first step towards student-centric learning was the significant change brought about in the objectives of the course outline form course objectives to specific learning outcomes (SLOS) for all courses.

#### **PARTICIPATROY LEARNING ACTIVITES**

Except for lead lectures given by faculty members, learning is made student centric through the following types of participatory activities that contribute to self management, knowledge development and skill formation at a personal and interpersonal level.

Individualized activities in participatory learning include project work, seminars, case studies and field-work.

Group activities in participatory learning include peer teaching, tutorials, group discussion, participating in Academic competitions. Interactive public lectures by eminent Resource persons, field survey/field work.

The intercollegiate and interdepartmental academic programmes encourage the same in addition to bringing a competitive edge to the academic endeavor of the students.

# 2.3.4. How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The college takes the following steps to nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students transform them into life-long learners & innovators:

- The department of computer science, IT, BCA and M.Sc (CS/IT) make use of the special lectures of experts through webcasting.

The college authority has always been encouraging the teaching faculty to adopt innovative practices. During the last four years considerable innovations have been adopted coping with demands. Group discussion and home assignments are integral part of the curriculum. In the science stream, project based (laboratory and field investigation), computer assisted and experiential learning are used regularly. Moreover, in house seminars and national/ regional workshops and seminars are regularly pursued. Question banks are being developed in the department. Interactive programmes with students and academicians are being organized regularly. Innovative practices such as group discussion, seminars are organized. The LCD, DVD, OHP and internet facilities are provided by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new approaches.

#### AUGMENTING TEACHING LEARNING

#### 2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

- The library manages to caters for the needs of teaching and students with access of books and journals.
- The college has a general library that caters for the needs of the teachers to take books for reference. Text books are kept in separate cupboards in library for teachers use. The books are available in the general library are issued to the students. Open access system is followed.
- The general library functions on all days except Sundays and government holidays.
- The books in the general library are categorized as Reference /Reserve/ Ordinary books.

- Book bank system provides text books which are kept as 'reserved' for the under privileged students and are issued for one semester.
- Question banks are available in the library for students reference.
- The librarian helps the departments to purchase the latest edition of the books as per the requirement of the teachers .

The college library provides card to the faculty and students. The resources available in the college library are notified to the students through circulars. Any new addition of books / journals or any access to new websites is notified by the Principal.

# INSTITUTIONAL APPROACHES TO ENSURE CURRICULUM COMPLETION

• The institution has built-in mechanisms to ensure curriculum completion within the planned time frame.

Some of these measures include:

- A well-prepared and complete college calendar for the entire year.
- Individualized comprehensive work plan is prepared in the beginning of each semester.
- Constant monitoring by the authority concerned in the implementation of the work plan.

Still it is possible that the institution faces a few challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar.

- The most common challenges faced is unexpected closure due to reasons beyond the control of the institution. The provision of additional working days in the college calendar helps the institution to manage this challenge effectively.
- A teacher absence for long period either due to personal/ medical/ maternity reasons could also create difficulties in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame. The management ensures proper arrangement for the completion of the curriculum through the appointment of substitutes.

• The demand for intensive teaching conceptual clarity for certain batches of students, especially for I year undergraduate students, extra classes are taken for the completion of the course content.

#### MONITORING MECHANISM OF TEACHING

The IQAC of the college monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching and learning. Internal assessments are regularly monitored and corrective measures are initiated, if necessary. Moreover, the faculty members are regularly sent for higher studies, orientation and refresher programmes for improvement of professional and competence.

# ENRICHMENT OF TEACHING-LEARNING PROCESS

  - Every year the college organizes an intense faculty orientation for fresh recruits at the beginning of the year.
  - The department organizes a minimum of one seminar and one training programme per year for faculty members.
  - A National conference is organized at the college level once in three years.
  - Departments make efforts by preparing and sending proposals for tapping the funds available at the national level for the conduct of workshops, seminars and conferences. Nomination for in house/outside programmes.
  - Faculty members are nominated from the college for national/international programmes for which funds are allotted by the management.
  - For specific national conferences, faculty members are deputized from the department based on their specialization and interest.
  - Faculty training is also provided in various departments with funding from the management.
  - Specialized training programmes are arranged for faculty members at the senior, middle or junior levels, across disciplines.

No teacher of the college has received any national or state level recognition or award for excellence in teaching during the last four years.

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Yes, The College has introduced evaluation of teachers by the students. The students are required to evaluate the teachers in their feedback every year. The feedbacks are processed and analyzed by the IQAC and then placed before the academic committee for necessary action. The academic committee makes policies for follow-up actions in this regard.

# 2.5 E VALUATION PROCESS AND REFORMS

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The marks scored in all unit tests, revision test, internal test and model examinations are displayed usually on the departments notice boards with the permission of the principal.

#### **STAKEHOLDERS AWARENES ON EVALUATION PROCESS**

- The evaluation process is made known to the stake holders during the departmental orientation when freshers come in to the college.
- Periodically Faculty advisors orient their suggestions regarding the same.
- A copy of the handbook is available in the college and every student is given a copy.
- The prospectus of the college carries much of required information regarding the evaluation process. Moreover, the academic calendar is indicating the time schedule for examination and evaluation for the year. The teachers take care to make them aware of the entire evaluation process at the college level as well as the university level. During the last four years, nearly 10 to 15 seminars have been organized for the students and the teachers on the new educational structure and recent trends under the semester system.

# 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

Semester system has been introduced by the university and the college has implemented the same minutely. As part of the same, 25% of the total marks of the papers are to be awarded by the college by conducting various internal assessment tools like seminar percentage, assignments, tests, group discussion etc.. The evaluation of the end-semester examination has been conducted in several zones. Students' achievement is evaluated on the basis of attendance, academic, extracurricular activities like sports, NSS, YRC etc..,

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The college has been zealously implementing the semester system of evaluation since its introduction. It has introduced the internal semester monitoring committee as per the instructions of the university which keeps an eye on the proper implementation of the same. The achievement of the student is measured mainly through the internal assessment and the external examination centrally conducted by the university. The internal assessment process has positively impacted the system by involving the students in some activities that help them acquire certain skills. For example, Paper Presentation in departmental seminars has been made compulsory and all the students prepare their papers with the help of the teachers and present the same. Group discussion has been introduced to make education a group affair and it has helped the students to develop inter-personal communication as well. At the university level, the decentralization of the evaluation process has made it more efficient and time bound. Moreover, the process on-the-spot evaluation by teachers in the evaluation zones has expedited the process of evaluation and declaration of results.

This monitors and communicates the progress and performance of the students by holding periodic meeting with the heads of the department after every sessional examination. Apart from this, the other tools of internal assessment are keenly monitored and the same are put before the academic committee. The marks of the internal assessment are displayed on the department concerned notice boards. The results of the annual examinations organized centrally by the university are discussed in the staff council meeting every year and plans are made for the next year accordingly.

2.5.6. Details on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioural aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

Internal assessment has remained a major indicator of performance of the students and the college ensures rigor and transparency in evaluating the same. Under the newly introduced semester system internal assessment covers 25% of the total marks and the respective departments have introduced various participatory evaluation mechanisms like paper presentation in students seminars, Group Discussions, Sessional test etc. These tools ensure due weightage to behavioural aspects, independent and group learning and communication skills. Regular attendance in classes, participation in class room activities, home assignments and project reports are assigned with due weightage.

Yes, The college and the teachers use assessment and evaluation as an indicator for evaluating students performance achievement of learning objectives and planning. A few examples are given below:

- a) Internal assessments are made purely on the basis of the performance of the students through various assessment tools. Fairness in this process is strictly maintained. There has been no record of awarding undue marks in the internal assessments.
- b) The centrally organized annual examinations and end-semester examinations are held every semester.
- c) ICT adherence to the established rules and regulations regarding maintenance of fairness. There has been no record of the college getting negative remarks in conducting examinations. Of course, there has been record of expelling students for trying to resort to unfair means.
- d) Maintenance of quality has been a part of the vision of college and the college is committed to the same.

The college has a strong mechanism to redress grievance related to evaluation both at the university and college levels. All grievances related to university examinations are collected, processed by the examination committee of the college and necessary steps are taken to communicate the same to the university authorities. The university has provisions for re–assessment and re–evaluation of the results. Regarding internal evaluation, the departments concerned are prompt to redress grievances, if any.

The college on its part, is holding classes, lectures, seminars, workshops, group discussion etc.., to orient the students to move towards institutional goals. Self-reliance, competence and a sense of equality are inculcated among the students. These markers of real learning are taken into account while assessing the students for internal evaluation. Although the final result cards of the students do not necessarily reflect these stated learning outcomes, the students of the college have been recognized in the society as disciplined well-cultured and selfreliant. The uniform of the college students itself is indicative of the respect for tradition, modernity as well as environment consciousness.



#### A) Curricular and Co-curricular activities

#### **Class rooms:**

Our College has 44 spacious class rooms with proper light arrangement and ventilation.

#### **Technology enabled learning spaces:**

The College has Information and Communication Technology (ICT) Classrooms where the provision of OHP, LCD projectors, Wi-Fi connectivity and internet access are given.

#### **Seminar Halls:**

The College has two seminar halls. These halls are regularly used for conducting seminars at the college, state and national level. The students of all departments are regularly promoted for active involvement in paper presentations and group discussion.

#### Laboratories:

The College has seven well-equipped laboratories for conducting all practicals in regular practical sessions and semester examinations. Similarly, the college has one technology fitted laboratory for conducting computer practicals.

#### **Specialized facilities:**

The College has one computer lab with nearly 84 Computers. The ratio of the computer and student is 1:1. The staff is given free access to internet so that they can enrich their knowledge and then in turn the students can benefit from their experience and knowledge. The fully computerized library also helps the staff and the students of under graduate classes to understand the value of research.

#### Equipment for teaching:

There are black boards, green boards, and one LCD projector with accessories and OHP.

#### **B) Extra -curricular activities**

#### Sports:

Our college has always created a niche for itself in the field of sports. The college for a long time has been participating in various inter-university, inter-college tournaments. In sports, our college provides indoor and outdoor games to all students.

#### **Outdoor** games:

A spacious area of 2 acre playground is available for outdoor games, i.e. cricket, hockey, hand ball, basket ball, ball badminton, kabaddi, 400 Mts track, football, volleyball, throw-ball, etc. on the college campus.

#### Indoor games:

Facilities for the sports like table tennis, chess, carom etc, are provided to students on the college campus only.

#### **Gymnasium:**

Our college has a well-equipped gymnasium room with all the modern equipment to improve health and hygiene aspects.

#### Auditorium:

The college has a splendid auditorium to conduct special seminars. The seating capacity of the hall is around 1000 students which includes the seating capacity of the gallery.

#### **NSS (National Service Scheme):**

Our college has 3 NSS units (2 units for male students & 1 unit for girls' students) which have 250 students. Various socially relevant services are rendered by NSS activities like blood donation camp, counter checking of pulse polio drive, adult education etc.

#### **Cultural activities:**

The college has carved out a special niche for itself in the field of extracurricular and extramural activities. The college has been regularly participating in the zonal and inter-zonal youth festivals. The students have been participating with full fervour and zeal in all academic, theatrical, fine arts or musical activities. They have proved their mettle in all the fields. In the last five years, the college has bagged many prizes which have brought laurels to our college.

#### Public speaking and communication skills development:

Personality development programmes are conducted by the college which involve various activities like public speaking and communication development etc. This aids the college faculty and students to enrich their art of communicative skills.

#### Yoga:

We have planned to create a training centre for yoga shortly.


#### Health and hygiene :

- ➢ For this the college keeps on organizing health check-up camps where local doctors, eye surgeons and skin specialists visit and keep a strict watch on the health of the stakeholders, the students and the staff.
- Proper arrangement of drinking water is available on the college campus at five different locations (purified drinking water). A first aid room is also there for the treatment of the sick.
- The institution has a tie up with the local hospitals for emergency needs. The local NSS unit is also very active in holding pulse polio drive. The volunteers willingly opt for the noble cause and help the nation to eradicate the problem of polio.

# Security:

Watchman shed and Gate-keeper room have been made near the gate for proper security. For visitors a visitor's pass will be given when they enter and they have to get signature on the pass from the person whom they have met while going out.





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## 5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate students' progression to higher level of education and / or towards employment?

#### Support services for students' progression

The institution facilitates students' progression to higher education by offering two Post Graduate Programmes.

- The Career Guidance and Placement Cell of the institution functions with the Main objective of building the career of students and brightening up their future. It often counsels the final year students on career options and prepares them higher Studies. It also arranges career guidance programmes and campus interviews.
- We conduct communication skill Development programme often at our college for the development of our students. Famous personalities and teachers are invited from various varsities and colleges. Our students are highly induced by the training methods of the resource persons.
- Weaker students are identified and proper coaching and special training is offered for them to increase the passing percentage. Besides, toppers are given special teaching and training to make them university rank holders.
- Language lab is our remarkable unit in our college. We have installed a specially designed language lab for the English aspirants for enhancing their language ability.

The principal of this institution takes utmost care in developing language skills among the students of this college, especially, the outgoing students and the students of final yearn are deeply involved and taken care of by the principal to make possible changes in them.

- Our students are compelled and impelled to engage class seminars compulsorily. Habit of conducting class seminars and presenting papers inside the class room would be very helpful for them to prepare and present papers in National and intercollegiate seminars. Every student is allocated a topic or unit before the day of engaging class seminar. They prepare a handout in which they mention the topic of the papers and circulate them to all students.
- In addition to that personality Development programmes are conducted here for shaping the students for their behavioural change . P.R.O s from reputed companies are invited here for teaching the verbal and nonverbal communications that has been followed by the students strictly at the time of interview. Some essential tips to be observed by the candidates are given to them in a printed format.
- Above all, soft skill training is offered to our students to become a successful Personality in their life. Particularly students are taught how to save a victim in an accident and how the students should develop the humanitarian thoughts.
- Spoken English is known as one of the major soft skills in the present day in all walks of life. That's why we teach Bridge course for the freshers when they print their foot inside the campus.
- We conduct computer training programmes under the banner of Sathak Institute of Technology (SITECH). Students are perfectly trained here for facing any tough situation when they go to attend interview or any other employable opportunities. We teachers train our students in the complicated area of computer science such as Hardware Networking and multimedia and the student's performance is periodically supervised and their proficiency is evaluated by the teachers.

The heads of the departments keep regular contact with the students and other stakeholders and their

suggestions are noted and utilized for the implementation and improvement of the policies and plans.

The top management, the Principal has a potential map of the faculty and is able to rightly identify their individual strengths, areas of interest and specialisation and accordingly assign responsibilities. We have a specific academic role for each teaching member of the department and promote innovations and inventions in the field of teaching and learning. The department protects the freedom of individual faculty members, appreciate their innovations and thereby ensure greater motivation. Besides, the Department sponsors and supports various academic programmes with funding and training.

The Principal exercises effective leadership by taking into consideration different points of view. The inner strengths are well utilized for the institutional development by creating a sense of belonging of our Principal. He envisions futuristic and time bound goals and executes participatory action plans. The college has eleven major departments viz. Arabic, English, Commerce, Business Administration, Electronics, Physics, Maths, Microbiology, Computer Science, Information Technology and Computer Application lead by the heads of the departments concerned. The department level activities are coordinated by the respective department heads according to the directions and instructions of the Principal. Further, distinguished faculty members are entrusted with the duty to organize the activities of different students' organisations like NSS, RRC, YRC and Sports Clubs. The faculty members, who are in charge of these organizations, lead the activities. The decisions are analyzed and discussed at various levels. The proper implementation of the institutional policies and programmes is achieved through mutual understanding, co-operation and appreciation. The leadership skills of our students also get enriched as they have to play the role of student coordinators in all the programmes undertaken by the college.

The college administration is decentralized to ensure the quality of educational provisions. Every member of the administrative staff is given charge of specific sections. The Superintendent supervises and coordinates the functioning of the accounts section, establishment section, purchases, examinations, student affairs and is accountable to the head of the institution. The paramount importance is given to take the appropriate steps to ensure qualitative teaching and prepare the students to face the challenges of modern world by the heads of the departments. They also manage their departmental work with the cooperation and assistance of their staff members and maintain departmental stock registers and other documents. Committees comprising teachers from different departments coordinate and conduct various activities and events in the college. The administration is decentralized for all academic activities. This system paves way for the sharing of duties and responsibilities, binding all stakeholders in a positive interaction and building good human relations.

Yes. The college promotes a culture of participative management, in which faculty members and students at all levels are encouraged to contribute their ideas and view points on institutional objectives, goals and other decisions that may directly affect them. The college has a staff council represented by the principal and heads of the departments. The council regularly meets and discusses issues pertaining to the effective management of academic as well as administrative matters. The college PTA consisting of parents and selected staff members pay attention to the managerial affairs when required. We have a college council that comprises Principal, Head of the departments and the selected staff members. The organization understands the importance of a strong relationship among the faculty members, staff and students and the stakeholders. The innovative ideas, opinions and suggestions from the faculty members, staff and students are appreciated and incorporated in the decision making process. The institution promotes great communication channels for perfect interaction of all stakeholders.

The organizational structure of the college involves leadership at several levels. In such a system, decentralization has been highly effective in taking decisions and implementing them.

- Both the top down and the bottom up approach are used to initiate new plans/suggestions.
- The institution has the culture of respecting the suggestion/feedback given by any member of the college community and parents.
- The proposed plans are discussed at the respective committees, fine-tuned and then implemented.
- Before finalizing any plan, the need for execution, the resources involved and the possible hurdles are carefully taken care of.

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### Teaching & Learning

We have a number of technology assisted quality improvement strategies in the institution. College's library is well-equipped with 5453 books, 32 journals, 33 magazines and 7 types of newspapers. Modern teaching methods using Wi-Fi broadband internet, interactive boards, LCD projectors, collar microphone, amplifiers and laptop computers are increasingly utilized in the classrooms to keep pace with the information explosion round the world. Our college provides opportunity to the teachers to attend orientation and refresher courses to make improvements in teaching. The centralized computing facility enhances the IT skills of our students and facilitates better teaching and learning. Members of the faculty encourage students to acquire knowledge from divergent sources. Thus interactive learning takes place through field work, study tours, group discussions, quizzes, workshops and academic seminars. group discussion, debates and seminars are conducted by all the departments. Extension lectures by academic scholars are offered to the students. Academic progress of the students is assessed through class tests. The tutorial system helps students to overcome learning difficulties.

#### R esearch & D evelopment

The Research Committee of the college encourages and motivates the teachers to take up research projects and fosters a culture of research among students and staff. The committee is also involved in synchronising and facilitating research activities carried out by the members of the faculty by providing relevant information, and updates the faculty members on the availability of funds and their sources. Presentation of research papers are undertaken by the faculty members.

#### Community Engagement

Community orientation is a fundamental principle, closely followed by the college. The NSS unit has adopted a rural village and supports it in different ways. The college has undertaken a survey on the problems of the educated rural people, and has prepared a documentary. Programmes like field visits, organising road safety awareness camps and blood donation campaigns are a few of the activities of the college. The college conducts blood group identification camps every year and keeps a registry of

blood donors, and provides blood to the blood bank and to the needy as and when occasion required.

#### Industry Interaction

The college fosters a culture of industry friendliness and creates opportunities for strong interaction of students with industries. The career guidance and placement cell conduct seminars and workshops in which different industries interact with our students and thus the students get a feel of the demands of the outside job market and the skills they have to develop. Industries also conduct job recruitment drives in the campus and also provide career seminars in association with the college.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The Principal collects reports of the activities of all departments and cells functioning in the college. These reports are discussed in the staff council to review the success and pitfalls. Consolidated reports are prepared by the principal and forwarded to the management from time to time.

The Management plays an important role in motivating the faculty for academic progress and efficiency. The faculty members are encouraged to participate and organize seminars, workshops, conferences and engage in research works. Faculty members are given periodical training like orientation and refresher courses to improve their performance. They are also provided with extra benefits for securing M. Phil / Ph.D. degrees and having passed in SET and NET. Some of our faculty members are engaged in doctoral researches and project works.

Teachers are given periodic training to update their technical know-how on recent developments in academic areas. Our college provides facility to all the faculty members to attend refresher and orientation courses.

Faculty members are permitted and relieved at once to attend National / International seminars with proper alternative work arrangement. Orientation courses, debates and workshops, labs help to improve the innovations of the faculty members and also create facilities for self improvement. The college takes initiatives to support all departments with proper funding from management to conduct national seminars, workshops etc. All faculty members are motivated to apply for minor/major project funded by UGC and to pursue research works individually. Computer training is given to all non teaching staff to do their work more efficiently and effectively. Our college takes initiatives to impart innovative knowledge among teaching and non-teaching staff.

# 6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

Our college uses Performance Appraisal System (PAS) to determine the training needs of the teaching faculty and administrative staff of the institution. Faculty training is provided periodically keeping in view of the job requirements. This institution often conducts staff refreshment and training programmes to the faculty members to edify the latest trends in teaching and training. Our management provides fair perks to faculty members on the basis of their nature of work, qualification and designation. The institution takes initiatives to maintain individual morale, group morale, job morale and organization morale of the employees, and also provides good working environment to the faculty members to motivate and retain them in the institution.

The institution makes good use of the self appraisal method and comprehensive assessment by students to assess the performance of the staff. The feedback is communicated to the teachers and staff so that they may make necessary improvements in their performance. Department staff meetings reflect specific issues in teaching and learning pointed out by the students, and arrives at a consensus regarding the remedial measures required.

Our college determines the needs of training and development only on the basis of performance appraisal reports and takes proper decisions regarding training at proper time. In addition to this, staff meeting is conducted to communicate curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular matters.

Contribution of EPF (Employees Provident Fund) by the employees as well as by the employer is one of the major welfare schemes available for the teaching and non teaching members in our college. Every month the share of the employees and the employer is properly paid to the PF office through Form Nos. 3,6 and 12 A.

Our institution creates opportunities for self improvement and provides negotiable salary, sound working atmosphere to assure job satisfaction among the staff. And the management and Principal encourage the faculty by giving high salary to the

lecturers with M.Phil /PhD / SET / NET qualifications. It helps the institution to attract and retain the eminent faculty.

- The college has instructed all the departments to take care of the students' grievances and help them redress the difficulties.
- The college has a student grievance cell to look into grievance of students if any. The formation of Students' grievance cell is to promote and maintain

a conductive and unprejudiced educational environment and to know whether students are experiencing infringement of their rights. It is a measure to develop responsive and accountable attitude among college officials to ensure that there is no laxity in terms of fair deal with the students. It is to deal with the complex situations in a tactful manner to lessen the condition felt to be oppressive or dissatisfied.

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- There is an Anti-Ragging committee to look into the grievances and complaints of First year students regarding any ragging incident.
- Counselling and mentoring system is followed in the departments to address the students' academic and personal issues.
- To create friendly approach to senior students and staff.
- To solve the students problem regarding exams i.e. results withheld and any revaluation process.
- To solve the students' problems regarding correcting the name, register number, date on birth, male or female, paper code etc (if there is any mistake) through our head of the department / controller of exams and Principal.
- To make arrangement for students' scholarship if there may be any problem that may arise.
- A suggestion box is placed outside the principal's office for the students. The college is open to suggestions with an eye on improvement in the functioning. In this respect, students are provided with the suggestion box as a vehicle to communicate their ideas on an anonymous basis if they prefer to do so.
- The main objective of students' grievance cell is the redressal of student's grievances to solve their academic and administrative problems and that co-ordinate between students and departments/sections to redress the grievances and to guide ways and means to the students to tackle their problems.

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#### • Practice

#### Evidence of Success

Number of students have changed their life styles by hearing the assembly message in our college. In addition to that, the students approach the teachers voluntarily to get a chance to present the message in the assembly. Above all, on every monday the achievers and students who have won the prizes in various competitions held at other colleges are honoured with certificates and medals by the head of the institute.

#### Problem encountered and Resource Required

Particularly our college is located in the down trodden area. Pupils come from the villages and hamlets. Their first aim is to get a degree not to learn BBE. Our management, principal and staff take a serious effort to conduct these kinds of programmes for the sake of development of the students. We have to allocate special hours to conduct this assembly because regular classes should not get affected by conducting this assembly at any cost.

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#### **BEST PRACTICE - II**

#### • Title of the Practice

Database System Corporation (DSC message broadcasting service.)

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Goal

Our major target is to send the communication to all our pupils and staff members on all occasions. Especially each and every moment of the students must be known by the parents. Besides, the parents should be aware of the day to day activities of their kids. Based on the above noted reasons we have installed exclusive software in our college for imparting all sort of information to the parents concerned related with the students and college activity. To avoid time delay and communication failure these kinds of strategies are implemented and executed by our management.

#### • The Context

Our students are properly intimated regarding the events of this college in time. The parents are strictly advised to read all the messages that are sent by the institute now and then. The appropriate contact numbers from the parents are collected by the admission wing at the time of students admission. A special wing is launched in our library to carry out this task. Our librarian has been assigned the duty of sending messages to our students.

#### Uniqueness

This is one of the fabulous methods in sending messages to the parents. Whatever the programme, event or activity designed by head of the institute, at once it reaches the mobile phones of the parents without delay. Even marks secured by the students in class test, unit test, revision test, model and university examinations are properly sent to the parents in the next minute after receiving the results. Parents can contact the department heads concerned at any time regarding the message received by them.

#### Constraints

Sometimes the message sent by this institute does not properly reach the parents because of changing the contact numbers frequently. But the parents fail to inform their new contact numbers to this college at once. The students come from remote villages and 80% of their parents are illiterate. Agriculture is the major source for them for earning daily bread. They are striving for their day today life. So message cannot be read and understood by the people to know the real position of their kids.

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#### Evidence of Success

At the time of parents teachers meet, we collect feedback from the parents to know the opinions of the students and parents about this college and its activities. Parents register their very positive comments at the conduct meetings, seminars, particularly conveying the details of their wards through DSC message broadcasting service. The feedbacks are safely kept in the departments as evidence. Students' personality traits and character angles are moulded by the teachers inside the class room with the cooperation of the students. Students cannot hide anything because of proper communication sent by this institute to their parents.

#### Problems Encountered and Resources Required

• The message sent by this institute only in English language. A few parents are not able to pore over the message due to their poor education. We are encountering a problem here how to make them understand the message sent by us. And we receive comments from the parents that it would be better for them if the messages are sent in Tamil. But we need special software to send Tamil message. We have put forth our obligation to the head of the institution to take necessary steps to install Tamil software. Presently, Tamil software is installed and parents receive the messages in Tamil also.
